Wild Side

Hard frosts have started and early mornings are often misty, as the dew from the ground condenses during the night.

What a difference these frosts have made to the trees. A couple more weeks and most will be bare. The oak keeps its autumn spectacle until November when it also 'rains' acorns; a welcome bonus for squirrels and jays. The birds enjoy turning over fallen leaves looking for spiders and insects and will search in the garden beds after you've been clearing up or digging. The robins are always first on the scene and at this time of year, spend a lot of time at the tops of trees or high vantage points singing a lovely tuneful song. Wrens and thrushes are also singing well at this time of the year.

Fishermen (or women) will be well aware that by November, the adult Atlantic salmon are migrating back to the place of their birth in the gravelly shallows upstream. The fish arrive from the sea, entering the estuaries and then move on to the rivers. It is said they find the river of their birth by smell and the chemical composition of the water. They swim upstream against the current to spawn, and unlike their Pacific cousins, many Atlantic salmon survive the spawning season and return to the sea, possibly repeating the arduous migration three times in a lifetime. The highlight for wildlife

watchers is seeing them leaping out of the water on their journey past waterfalls, weirs and cauld. For fishermen, no doubt, the highlight is somewhat different. There has been a good turnout of fishers this year; let's hope they've had a good season so far. If the numbers of wee fish in the burns are any indication of future seasons, things are looking rosy. Much will depend on the fish-eating birds like goosanders, herons and cormorants, I fear.

If the weather's too cold for you to venture far and you can't see the bird feeders in your garden, there's always some Wildlife to watch on TV. Until the end of November, the BBC Autumnwatch programme is on Thursday evenings. A different format to usual with one weekly show for eight weeks and no more Simon King (sob!) but still full of down to earth advice on watching wild life and full of ideas for things to do outdoors in Autumn.

Best of all, wrap up warm and just get outside to enjoy the last of the glorious autumn colours, flocks of feeding birds, the last of the fungi and rekindle your youth by kicking up or leaping into piles of fallen leaves. It'll make that bowl of hot soup even better!

Rural Round-Up

The nights are fairly drawing in but you can always guarantee a warm welcome at the Rural!

This month another well known face to the Rural, Jenny Beddoe-Stephens, came and spoke with great conviction about the work she had done with the charity Lepra helping those affected by leprosy in India. Her slides showed the terrible side effects that are caused by this condition and the work that is being done to try and combat it. Although Jenny had seen scenes of terrible poverty and illness she had found India to be a wonderful country and spoke of how welcome everybody there had made her. Leprosy is still a big problem not only in India but across the world. Scottish Borders Free Insulation Offer

Some very good news! You can afford to reduce your heating bills this winter.

Scottish Borders Council has been successful in a bid to the Scottish Government for a free insulation measures scheme in the Tweeddale area for all homeowners and those in privately rented property.

* All cavity wall insulation, loft insulation and loft insulation top-ups are provided for free.

* Enabling measures such as work on loft hatches, scaffolding, water tanks and pipes in the loft space are also provided free through the scheme.

* It does not cover items such as partial lofts, flat roofs, coombs, solid wall insulation and draught-proofing.

This scheme is a fantastic chance for you to get your home insulated for nothing. It may seem too good to be true but it is absolutely above board and as simple as it seems. The Scottish Government is investing this money to reduce our energy needs and to improve the quality of housing in Scotland.

How will the scheme work?

From November:

The letter about the scheme arrives.

You contact the Energy Saving advice centre by phone on 0800 512 012 (mention Tweeddale free insulation offer) or wait for an assessor to call.

You will be asked to answer a number of questions about your home etc.

A free survey is then organised to assess what work is possible or necessary.

After the survey contractor will arrange a date for the work and it will be carried out, *free of charge*.

You then enjoy reduced bills and a warmer home.

All work is planned for completion by March 2011.

The sooner you respond the sooner it will be done.

Additional Feature - Interest free loans

Interest free loans are available to householders in the Tweeddale area as part of the scheme. These can be used to pay (or part pay) for the costs of replacing old, inefficient boilers, renewable technologies and solid wall insulation.

Loans of between £500 and £10,000 are available (please note: loans are only available up to a maximum of £4,000 for solar photovoltaic (PV), wind turbines and small scale hydro technologies) and are paid back in monthly installments over a maximum of eight years.

The savings you can make may make this worthwhile.

You might for example;

* Save over £200 per year by installing a new boiler

* Generate over £800 by generating electricity using solar panels

* Reduce heat loss through solid walls and save around £360 per year.

Tweed Fishing at Walkerburn

October News from the River Bank.

The month of October was one of very mixed fortunes. The weather changed frequently and with it the amount of water varied considerably from 'not enough' to 'far too much'!

The diary for 16th October noted that:

"with the water draining away all week to, now, below normal summer level (off the gage outside the hut) conditions have got very difficult. All the more frustrating after a near record week the week before and such a huge run of fish in the system.

But records are what they are and just three fish were put in the book for the past week, 15, 10 and 5lbs, bringing our autumn total so far to 31 Salmon (which we shouldn't forget included fish of 23, 20, 19 and 18lbs) and 6 sea trout to 7lbs.

Keep praying for rain."

A week later, the entries for 22nd and 23rd October read:

"We have only two rods on and dead low water, but a couple of inches of fresh water bought the fish back on.

Fane Gaffney had a nice 12lb fish from the Weaver. Jan Hogarth then had a 9 pounder from the Clure and handed the rod to her husband, who promptly hooked and landed a 5 pounder followed by a huge old cock fish of 26lbs from the same pool. (So there goes the theory that women catch all the big fish!)

At the end of the same day Steve then had a cast and added an 8lb fish to the total from the Weaver. 5 fish for a day under these conditions is terrific."

"23rd Oct, and low water continued until Saturday lunchtime when the river rose to just under 2ft and coloured badly, washing us off.

With just a Salmon (8lbs) and a Seatrout (6lbs) on Friday and a single Salmon on Saturday morning (12lbs) all slightly coloured and all caught and returned from the Bridge pool, we finished with 10 Salmon to 26lbs and the Seatrout. Not bad for low water and seemingly hopeless conditions.

With a bit of luck the water over the weekend will move some fresh fish up river."

29th October:

Water 1'1" and steady. A 5lb Grilse for Craig Pauley and two more to our favourite ghillie at last knockings. A 25 pounder and a 12 pounder. All three from the Bridge Pool. All three returned.

Heavy rain last night and the river is already rising this morning.

1st November

Water 1'6" and clear. Perfect conditions but lots of stale fish about and 5 lost this morning. But John Evans did manage his biggest ever Salmon from the Cauld Hole just after lunch at 25lbs a slightly stale hen and Peter Flockhart followed on with a fairly fresh fish of 9lbs from the Clure. Both fish were returned.

Reports of big catches on some of the lower beats will hopefully mean a run of fresh fish are coming up river.



2nd Nov

Water up to 2ft on Monday night, back down to 1ft 9ins in the morning but back up to over 2ft during the afternoon on squally gale force winds and heavy showers.

Well done to our new owner John Miller for his first ever Scottish

Salmon, from Upper Caberston - a cracking 12 pound cock fish, barely two days off the tide, out of the Clure!

Well done also to John Evans for following his 25lbs salmon yesterday (his biggest ever) with a cracking 9lb Sea trout from the Bridge Pool.

Great to see fresh fish coming through but we need it to stop raining and let the fish settle now.

Extract from the Draft Minutes of meeting held on 18th October 2010

Monthly Report from WCDT

The Secretary WCDT reported that:

a. Allotments Development. Work was well underway and WCDT has obtained a felling licence to fell the Sitka Spruce on condition the area was replanted with broadleaf trees. The spruces were too close to houses and may become landlocked in future which would make felling much more difficult and expensive. WCDT has been successful in obtaining a grant through Woodland Trust to purchase 400 broadleaf trees and shrubs for landscaping the whole field area. Planting would take place in November/December or the Spring as a Community event.

b. Vattenfall had not yet lodged an appeal so no reason to meet as yet re Community Gain negotiations. These would begin again as soon as an appeal is lodged. Company keen to reach settlement before any appeal is heard.

c. SBC successful in gaining a substantial grant for insulation work in Peebles, Innerleithen and Walkerburn areas. Householders need to have an energy assessment of their property completed which may then mean any insulation work can be carried out free of charge. Also available will be low cost loans for installation of renewable energy units. Both schemes coming on stream shortly. WCDT trying to raise awareness within the community.

Police Business

PC Craig Rogerson unable to attend but had sent in a police report. With regard to the suggestion by a member of the Borders Party that police attendance at CC meetings was a waste of police time, all present strongly refuted this. It was seen as a vital link to communities particularly with forthcoming cuts. It allows a useful exchange of information and builds confidence in the police service within the community. Chair reported that Community Safety Teams making progress with community involvement and keeping the two way contact.

Planning

Minch Moor Windfarm: Still nothing so far on any appeal.

Broadmeadows Windfarm: Members encouraged to attend public consultation meetings re Broadmeadows at Caddonfoot Village Hall 5 - 8.30pm Wednesday 20th October and Yarrowford 3 - 8.30pm Tuesday 19th October. Response to amended application to be discussed at November meeting.

Local Plan Report: Important for members to read as will direct what happens in planning in future. Critical pages to be printed for circulation.

Report on SBCCN Seminar

Mr Thornton reported on a successful and useful seminar attended by himself and Miss McIntosh. The seminar discussed the 'Big Society' where community spirit, self help and involvement was encouraged. Networking with other Community Council members also useful. Miss McIntosh reported that WCC was held in high regard for how it operates. Gillian Steele (Chair Innerleithen, Traquair and the Glen CC) to be invited as an observer to a future WDCC meeting.

Mr Thornton provided a written report - lodged with secretary.

Reports by Members

a.) Mr Brett proposed that members formally agreed to the new Code of Conduct as read and discussed. Seconded Ms Ogilvie. Passed.

b.) Mrs Thornton commented re the clearance of the flower beds at the Memorial Garden. All considered it too early and queried whether plants could be donated or sold at low cost to community to avoid waste. Cllr Herd to follow up.

e.) Ms Ogilvie expressed her thanks for the Road Safety on the pavements around the village. Mrs Horsburgh intimated that responsibility for these was due to a parent member of the school parent council and Phillippa Gilhooley from SBC as part of the School Travel Plan and Safe Routes to School initiative. She would pass on her expression of thanks.

f.) Condition of 'Twenty's Plenty' signs queried. Mrs Horsburgh to report to Cllr Herd

g.) Possibility of 'Children Playing' sign at end of private road near WRFC to be investigated.

h.) Congratulations to WRFC for ground maintenance and attractive new fence at Caberston Haugh.

i.) Ms Ogilvie commented on the Mental Health Strategy and it's emphasis on the value of craft workshops etc for those with mental health problems. Queried whether money was available to run workshops in conjunction with those run at previously at WRFC and now in ex-SBC unit. Cathie Sutherland (WCDT) asked for comment. She reported that WCDT can apply for funding for sessional workshops for the community but that the individual running the current craft workshops was

a business and could only be employed via grant funding for community workshops.
